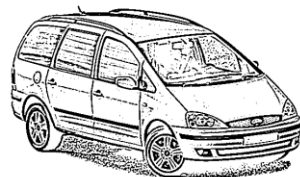

## Dog Fouling

Several residents have asked us to include an article in "The Mosaic" to express how appalled they are at the way in which some dog owners allow their pets to foul private driveways, verges and even the cricket pitch without clearing up after them.



It is fully appreciated that there are many dog-walkers who are not villagers but nevertheless this is a really unpleasant, discourteous practice and there is absolutely no need for it - there are two dog litter bins in the village which the council regularly empty. Although there is a potential fine of £1,000, identifying the culprits to date has been problematic but some form of action is clearly required.

It is recognized that many pet owners conscientiously clear up after their animals but to those who don't, please be aware that there is at least one villager who is thinking seriously about installing CCTV cameras.

We have also been asked to pass on some useful advice from other pet-lovers regarding the effects of hot weather on animals. Hopefully, all dog owners are well aware of the extreme distress caused by leaving their dogs in a car with little or no ventilation or shade. But this can also extend to animals being left alone during the day at home without monitoring their condition. It may be worthwhile, if you are having to leave your pet unattended for any reason, to having a quick chat with your neighbours to check that there have been no signs of distress – the most obvious one being constant barking or whining. This, of course, is upsetting for the people around and not just the animal.

## Slugs, Snails & ..... Hedgehogs

A perpetual gardening dilemma is how to control slugs and snails while also encouraging the beneficial wildlife which act as natural pest controllers.

At the end of June the sale of metaldehyde slug pellets was banned. If you see any store selling them you can remind them of their legal obligation to remove them from sale. These slug pellets are not safe for wildlife, the pellets and poisoned molluscs can be eaten by pets, birds and hedgehogs causing them an agonising death.

There are many safer alternatives that can be tried if necessary such as nematodes, egg shells, grit, copper tape and wool pellets. Or they can just be left as a delicious meal for any prickly visitors!

As well as the slugs & snails in your garden the hedgehogs and other wildlife will greatly appreciate a bowl of water during these warm and dry periods, it really can be a lifesaver for them.

If you have any hedgehog news that you would like to share with me then feel free to email me. It has been wonderful hearing about sightings around the village, especially of the hoglets recently.

## Thanks and Welcome

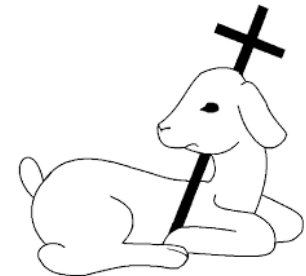
